### **Celebrating Our Students**

- Christopher Odette and Jay Melzer from the Sierra Vista Campus and Alicia Raber and Luis Carlos Estrada from the Douglas Campus were awarded full scholarships from the Arizona Board of Regents.
- Jill Donnelly became the national goat tying and all-around cowgirl champion at the College National Finals Rodeo. The women's rodeo team placed third overall.
- Welding student, Gabe Lewis, won silver at the state SKillsUSA welding competition.







- Phi Theta Kappa Alpha Mu Zeta Chapter on the Sierra Vista Campus won the International Top 100 Chapter Award and an International Award for their Honors in Action (HIA) Project. The HIA project was entitled Strategies of Community College Students, Staff, and Faculty During the COVID-19 Pandemic: Leaving A Legacy Through Podcasting. The podcast was spearheaded by Summer Hom and showcased students, faculty, and staff and how they were managing stress, work, and school under COVID-19 restrictions.
- Women's soccer won the Region 1 Division 1 championship for the first time in school history.
- The men's basketball team won the Arizona Community College Athletic Conference (ACCAC) state and Region I titles.



# Community is Our Middle Name

The college distributed its first county-wide community survey to aid in the college's planning efforts. 434 participants completed the survey. The goal of this year's survey was to gather information about how much Cochise County values attaining a college degree or certificate and to assess the community's perception of Cochise College.

- The Culinary Arts Program teamed up with the Sierra Vista Sunrise Rotary and the Salvation Army to prepare turkeys for Thanksgiving.

### **Notable Achievements**

Cochise College offers a direct pathway to universities and provides seamless transfer to all three Arizona state universities, as well as dozens of other universities, through agreements that guarantee credit transfers.

In addition to working with our transfer partners, Cochise College began its participation in Arizona's Reskilling and Recovery Network (RRN) to identify and scale strategies that give workers the skills necessary to succeed in a post-pandemic economy. The network is a collaborative effort of Arizona's 10 community colleges, the Office of the Governor, ARIZONA@WORK, business and industry leaders, Achieve60AZ, and local workforce development leaders.





- The Residential Construction Technology program completed its third house despite a five-week delay due to the coronavirus pandemic
- The college hosted an open house and ribbon cutting ceremony for cutting-edge cybersecurity and virtual reality classrooms and labs
- Guests toured a new state-of-the-art Automotive Technology Building during an open house and ribbon cutting ceremony
- Cochise College held its first drive-through commencement ceremonies celebrating the 2,688 graduates from the classes of 2020 and 2021 at the Douglas and Sierra Vista campuses.
- 22 graduates participated in the Adult Ed General Education Development (GED) recognition ceremony on May 27.








- 11 classrooms were remodeled to accommodate new social distancing guidelines.
- The majority of classes moved to remote learning as an online and/or live-streaming model.


 Cleaning stations were set up in each classroom and plexiglass partitions were added in student service areas.

 WiFi was expanded to parking lots on the Douglas and Sierra Vista campuses and Benson and Willcox Centers.

 Laptops and WiFi hotspots were available for students to check out for free.

 The new Cochise Cupboard food pantry program opened for business.

 Nearly 350 students participated in the Student Government Association activities and several other clubs adapted to a virtual format to provide leadership development, social activity, and support networks.
