

Letter from the President



As I sit back and review the last 12 months, I am once again amazed by all of the accomplishments of our exceptional students and hardworking faculty

accomplishments of our exceptional students and hardworking faculty and staff. We continue to face monumental challenges as we recover from the global pandemic, but the college remains steadfast in its commitment to our community.

Last year we presented a Quality Initiative Proposal to our accreditation body, the Higher Learning Commission, as a part of the requirements for continued accreditation. Using a Strategic Think Tank committee of over 30 faculty and staff members, the college pursued a college-wide self-evaluation and reflection process, which resulted in the revision of our vision, mission and guiding statements, which were implemented throughout the college community in August. In addition, the committee identified four key areas of institutional improvement; Equitable Technology Access, Wellness, Data Management and Reporting, and Academic Programs and Curriculum.

We have already begun making strides in these areas as we have spent the last year building new relationships, strengthening existing partnerships and working hard to lay the foundation for our programs of the future. This spring, I hosted the Arizona Commerce Authority for a tour of Fort Huachuca to collaborate on ways to provide accelerated workforce programs, with stackable credentials and microcertifications available across the county. I also had the privilege of meeting with officials at the Douglas Port of Entry to identify ways for the college to provide training to our citizens to support those efforts. To provide equitable technology access to our community, we have partnered with the City of Douglas as a grant recipient that will bring high-speed internet to the City of Douglas and our Douglas Campus.

To support our wellness initiative, we expanded mental health services by launching an app to provide private on-demand mental health sessions to our students, offering onsite counseling, a mental health resources toolkit and a food pantry to enhance our food insecurity capabilities. Lastly, we were fortunate to be awarded a \$550,000 grant from the Legacy Foundation to develop a new behavioral health certificate. This program will provide training for entry-level employment, which is a much-needed resource in Cochise County.

Once again, our students, faculty and staff continue to adapt to the challenges placed before them. We are forever grateful to our community, who never stops supporting us.

I hope you'll enjoy our 2021-2022 Year in Review.





Notable Achievements

Cochise College provides over 100 general and technical education programs leading to a variety of workforce certificates and associate degrees and provides an affordable and accessible pathway to Arizona universities.

- Dr. Rottweiler hosted senior members of the Arizona Commerce Authority for a tour of Fort Huachuca and collaborated with senior military leaders, community partners and state leaders on new ways for the college to provide workforce accelerator programs to the county.
- Cochise College participated in College Workforce Day at the Arizona Capitol with other community colleges around the state.
 College representatives spoke to legislators about our programs and we showcased our aviation simulator, ambulance and nursing simulation mannequins. Four students also had the privilege to take a tour of the capitol building and meet with elected officials.
- Cochise announced a new Basic Behavioral Health Sciences Certificate, thanks to a \$550,062 grant from the Legacy Foundation of Southeast Arizona. Thank you to the Legacy Foundation and our community partners! Together, we are addressing the mental health needs in our communities and building a local workforce.



- Cochise College students and faculty from Bio 192 (Special Topics in Biology) joined staff from Prescott College, Kino Bay Center, and representatives from the Seri/Comcáac indigenous people to sample eelgrass (Zostera marina) from the Canal Del Infiernillo in the Gulf of California.
- Cochise College students helped the local Grupo Tortuguero in Bahia Kino, Sonora, Mexico to measure, weigh, and tag green sea turtles (Chelonia mydas), also known as tortugas negra or prieta. They honored us by naming a newly caught turtle: Cochise.
- Cochise College expanded early college opportunities by reducing tuition for dual credit courses, using college faculty to offer classes at Buena High School, and entering into a new partnership with the American Leadership Academy Virtual (ALA-Virtual).



Supporting Students

THROUGH STUDENT SUCCESS

Initiatives that support academic success were incorporated into learning and student support outside the classroom.

- The Connections For Success curriculum for first semester students was revamped to include required engagement for students on and off campus.
- The TRiO Student Support Services federal grant program was awarded for an additional five years, serving over 160 students per year with intensive advising and programming.
- Cochise Cupboard's food insecurity program expanded to include hygiene kits, a partnership with a local farm, and a new emergency food meal plan option.
- Mental health services expanded to include weekly oncampus counseling sessions for students provided through a local partnership, and the launch of the META App made private, on-demand mental health sessions available to students when needed.
- A new Career Services Coordinator position was created to expand job placement and internship opportunities for students.
- 1,000 appreciation bags that included mental health tips, tools and resources were distributed to students and employees.
