our annual staff & faculty convocation. Last year, the theme of my presentation was "Disrupting/ Innovating Education in a VUCA World." We live in a volatile, uncertain, complex, and ambiguous (VUCA) world, and we acknowledge that we need to find innovative ways to "disrupt" what we have always done so we can adapt to these changing and sometimes challenging times. I challenged my colleagues to be creative and innovative as we continue our mission of providing accessible education opportunities that support social responsibility, community engagement, meaningful careers, and lifelong learning.

As I look back at all of last year's accomplishments, I couldn't be prouder of what the college has done to accept this challenge and lay the groundwork to predict change, re-invent how we train and educate our students, strengthen our connection to the community through new and existing partnerships, and to embrace what makes Cochise College extraordinary.

We were excited to announce the approval from our accrediting body, the Higher Learning Commission (HLC), to offer two baccalaureate degree programs of critical need: a Bachelor of Science in Nursing and a Bachelor of Applied Science in Leadership, Management, and Operations.

by providing modernized training facilities.
In addition to breaking ground at our Sierra
Vista Campus on two new buildings that will
be completed in early 2025, the college's First
Responders Academy held two ribbon cuttings.
The first was in partnership with the City of Sierra
Vista for a Driving Track on Guilio Cesare Ave. In
addition, we unveiled an innovative ambulance
simulator that utilizes virtual reality technology for
EMT and Paramedic training in collaboration with
SimLeader.



Cochise College is a public, two-year institution that serves the residents of Cochise County at two campuses and four centers in Southeast Arizona. Cochise provides more than 90 general and technical education programs leading to a variety of workforce certificates, associate degrees and now, two bachelor's degrees! It is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission and is a federally designated Hispanic-serving institution.

In July, the First Responders Academy completed two groundbreaking projects:

- o In partnership with the City of Sierra Vista, a 4.8 acre driving track was constructed to provide first responder and commercial driver students a space to practice and improve their skills in a safe, controlled environment.
- The college also partnered with SimLeader to develop an ambulance simulator that utilizes mixed reality technology. It allows EMT and paramedicine students to get hands-on, immersive training like never before.

Lanae's gratitude and enthusiasm for learning and personal development are reflections of why the Cochise College Foundation, managing its largest endowment in history at this time last year, is not especially concerned that its endowment value has dropped. The reasons for the drop are great ones – students!

Expenditures made by the foundation in keeping with donor wishes mean students will have the opportunity to live on the Sierra Vista Campus come January 2025. Simultaneous construction of both the residence hall and the new indoor firearms training facility may not have been possible without a sizable bequest by the late George Bugen of Bisbee.

The foundation board and staff are extremely honored that George and other donors entrust us to see their charitable goals come to fruition. Because of your confidence and generosity, nearly \$400,000 in gifted assets helped with things like the funding of test vouchers for students pursuing high school equivalency, the purchase of simulation law enforcement vehicles and a medevac helicopter to train first responders, the provision of fuel vouchers for those traveling long distances to class, and the building of a house by residential construction technology students. In addition, 986 scholarships were awarded to 768 students in 2023-2024.

This is exciting stuff! Where community generosity meets college opportunity and student need is a terrific place to be. I salute all who participated in the foundation mission to promote student success last year and every year. Students succeed because you are generous.


